Dear Members of Congress:

The undersigned 74 anti-trafficking and anti-violence organizations write today to urge you to protect access to lifesaving victim services for over 3,000 survivors of human trafficking in the US. **Today, without grant agreements in place to dispense FY25 funds, the Department of Justice cut off funding for over 100 victim service providers, serving at least 3,000 survivors.** The DOJ Office for Victims of Crime has yet to release any notices of funding opportunities for the \$88 million in appropriated funds from FY25 appropriations. Without new grants, over 100 communities will lose a crucial service provider that helps keep their communities safe. Survivors need these services to escape trafficking and rebuild their lives.

Congress established these victim services programs in the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 and subsequent reauthorizations (TVPA). Congress has overwhelmingly voted to continue these programs over the last 25 years and increase funding to ensure survivors across the country are able to escape their traffickers and access the services and support that they need to survive. Congress should take action to ensure the Department of Justice distributes grant funds in accordance with the TVPA and Congressional appropriations. Protecting and fully funding these lifesaving programs is critical to protecting survivors and preventing re-exploitation.

Consistent federal funding puts providers in a better position to quickly help survivors seeking safety. With these grants, they can meet emergency needs that help survivors escape, like housing, food, and medical care. The funding allows for comprehensive services like case management, reunification for families separated by trafficking, mental healthcare, assistance in finding safer jobs, legal support, and community support, which support survivors in long-term healing and financial stability. The sustained nature of these funds has allowed providers to expand these services to more survivors each year. Any lapse in funds will threaten over 3,000 survivors' access to services.

We urge all members of Congress to protect the victim services that survivors need to survive, including by:

- 1. Immediately urging the US Attorney General to release the FY25 TVPA funds and conduct the grant solicitation process.
- 2. Pressuring the DOJ **to provide invitations to FY22 grantees for non-competitive awards of at least one year** to allow them to continue to serve over 3,000 survivors until the FY25 grants are in place.
- 3. Conducting oversight to ensure the appropriated funds are spent in accordance with the TVPA to prevent a catastrophic lapse in services.

Allowing these funds to disappear would enable human trafficking and put survivors' lives at risk. Many regions will lose their only service provider, leaving survivors with no safe emergency housing, case management, or counseling. Communities will be made less safe as traffickers would exploit with impunity, and fewer survivors will be able to come forward.
